Weekly Advent Prayer Service

Begin with the Sign of the Cross and lighting of the candle(s) for the week.

Read the Gospel for that Sunday:

Week 1: Mark 13: 33-37

Week 2: Mark 1: 1-8

Week 3: John 1: 6-8, 19-28

Week 4: Luke 1: 26-38

Conclude with an Our Father, Hail Mary and Glory Be.

Epiphany Home Blessing

Epiphany is traditionally the day when homes are blessed. Each room of the house may be blessed: For example, "May this room be blessed in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit."

It is also customary to mark the door of the house with the year and the initials of the Three Magi: Casper, Melchior and Balthasar. Crosses separate the letters and the numbers.

20 + C + M + B + 12

The letters represent the Magi; the crosses mark the four corners of the earth or all nations; and the divided year encloses all, signifying the timelessness of God.

Leader: Peace to this house.

All: And to all who dwell or enter here.

Leader: Magi came from the East to pay homage to the Lord, and opening their treasures they offered him gifts: gold for his kingship, frankincense to proclaim him God, and myrrh for the day of his burial.

With chalk, an inscription is made above the door with the Leader's words:

20 + C + M + B + 12

Leader: The three wisemen Casper(C), Melchior(M), and Balthasar(B) followed the star of God's Son who became man two thousand years ago. May Christ (+) Bless our dwelling (+) and remain (+) with us throughout the New Year (+).

All: Amen.

Leader: Visit this home, we ask you, O Lord, and bless it. Let here abide the health and goodness, humility and faith, and every triumph over sin. Let your word be obeyed and fulfilled here, and thanksgiving ever offered to you. May your blessing be always upon us Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, now and forever. *(Everyone makes the Sign of the Cross.)*

All: Amen.

Leader: May all who come to our home this year rejoice to find Christ living among us; and may we seek to serve Christ in everyone we meet.

All: Amen.
