CONTINUING EDUCATION PROGRAM AT MAIN CAMPUS:

CE-SY 18: ECCLESIOLOGY: THE CHURCH WE BELIEVE IN

This course will explore the history and development of the self-understanding of the Church, especially through the insights arising from the Second Vatican Council document *Lumen Gentium*. We will look at more recent biblical and theological insights into the historical and sacramental nature of the Church, its mission, its ministry, and its magisterium.

CE-SS II: INTRODUCTION TO THE OLD TESTAMENT I: PENTATEUCH & MONARCHY

Within the narrative and teachings of the Hebrew Scriptures will be found the fundamental doctrines of biblical revelation that formed and informed Jesus of Nazareth and the Christian Church. In this course we will view Act I, Scene 1 of the Bible, the story of the burgeoning relationship between God, the world and especially His chosen people, Israel, giving special attention to some major themes.

CE-MO 12: CHRISTIAN ETHICS IN CONTEMPORARY SOCIETY

This Course introduces the basic concepts of an authentic moral life in light of the philosophical tradition and Christian vision. It examines some of the contemporary issues in ethical decision-making in the area of personal and social ethics.

CE-SY 27: ESCHATOLOGY: OUR HOPEFUL FUTURE INTO GOD

This course will examine important themes of Judeo-Christian hope: [a] Understanding (head): biblical insights; contemporary Church teaching and theological developments on dying, death, resurrection, communion of saints, purgatory, heaven, hell; comparison with other religions; [b] Spirituality (heart): how to make one's entire life a preparation for death; how to deal with the death of dear ones; [c] Action (mouth, hands & feet): ministry to the dying; how to speak of death to children; the Christian's relation to the world (social and cosmic responsibilities, ecology, ecofeminism).

CE-MO 13: SPIRITUALITY AND ART

The influence of visual art on the spirituality of humanity, the Church and the individual will be addressed. We will study the viewing, interpreting, creating and reacting to works of art in the context of spirituality.

CE-SS 07: INTRODUCTION TO THE OLD TESTAMENT II: PROPHETS & WISDOM LITERATURE

In this course we will view Act I, Scene 2 of the Bible, namely, the continuing story of God's relationship with Israel from the 10th – 2nd century BCE, focusing especially upon the nature and content of the prophetic and wisdom writings, while giving some attention to the religious roles of priest, prophet and sage, worship, and the emergence of messianism and apocalypticism.

CE-SS 00: INTRODUCTION TO THE SACRED SCRIPTURES

The Church encourages all of the Christian faithful to read Sacred Scripture, God's inspired and revelatory word. The threefold purpose of this course is to [1] guide the student in a proper understanding of the written word of God in the light of Catholic life and teaching, to [2] introduce the student to the art and science of interpreting this "treasure of Revelation entrusted to the Church" (*Dei Verbum* 26), and [3] to find various methods and means of applying the Scriptures to the student's personal and ministerial life.
